Students will demonstrate an understanding of the rich complexities of the social, political, economic and cultural life primarily of people of African descent in the United States but also those in the African diaspora and on the continent.

Students will also gain knowledge and content by participating in conferences and programming (such as Black History Month events, lectures and other off-campus programs)

Scholarship and knowledge are assessed through embedded questions in exams/quizzes, papers and presentations. A collaboratively constructed rubric will be used to measure outcomes in the required courses for majors/minors. Student evaluations will also act as indirect measures of the outcome. To directly evaluate the outcome, the faculty will meet yearly to review samples of course materials of the core courses.
